Rio Douro

3 REGIONS, 2 COUNTRIES, 1 DESTINATION

Castille and León, in conjunction with the North and Central regions of Portugal, has developed a joint tourism project for the three regions that brings together similar tourist resources and products under this slogan with the great Iberian river that unites us, the Douro-Douro, as the centre point.

On these pages, which highlight the tourist attractions it holds and have the Douro-Douro as the one of the connecting features, you can plan out a great wine tour or smaller trips on this extensive trail, which stands as one of the world's great wine rivers. The river basin is home to 18 separate designations of origin and the greatest variety of wines and vines, with wine tours promoted and organised specifically for wine tourism that take in the wealth and diversity of countryside and heritage lying between Soria and Porto over a 980 kilometre-long journey running east to west or vice versa. Start your adventure in the Douro estuary, with its port and its bridges, or at the source of the river in the Urbión mountains in Soria. You can also travel from north to south, or south to north, along its tributaries in the vast river basin, where you can find mountains and grasslands that boast 47 natural areas that have some level of environmental regulation and protection.

All of this great diversity entails a variety of agricultural and livestock output which creates a rich range of produce. This makes for a local cuisine of great depth which you can sample in restaurants, taverns, and inns all over these unique areas.

Together, the three regions contain the highest number of UNESCO world heritage sites. In total, there are 19 where you can soak up art, history, culture, and the landscape. These are joined by the biggest assortment of cathedrals in the whole of Spain and Portugal. The 28 sites feature examples from nearly all architectural styles and periods, including modern architecture.

Sephardic heritage is another part of the history and culture you can see in your travels around this large European macro-region. At present, there are 27 sites which have been honoured or recognised in some form: synagogues, houses, courtyards, cemeteries, historic sites. This number will rise and we will be adding new tourist attractions, such as museums, castles, and archaeological sites to this project.





Aranda de Duero has been awarded the title of European Wine City 2020 by RECEVIN, competing with incredible places like Haro, Rueda or La Palma del Condado. Due to the exceptional situation that happened in 2020, it has been extended during the years 2021 and 2022.



In the centre of the extensive fertile plain irrigated by the river Duero, lies the capital of the no less extensive riparian region: Aranda de Duero.

Repopulated in the 9th century, the name of this Castilian city appears for the first time in the Council of Husillos held in 1088. However, it already had very ancient settlements from whose languages it takes its name, Aranda, which means "wide plain", while Duero comes from the river's name. In the 13th century, Sancho IV and Pedro I had already granted the town the privilege of royal status, a status that the people of Aranda never wished to relinquish. Proof of this was demonstrated when, during the reign of Fernando IV, Diego López de Haro wanted to take over the town. The tower of the church of Santa María, built in the 12th century as a defensive feature of the town, bears witness to such courtly intrigues.

Court in the reign of Henry IV, where Archbishop Alfonso Carrillo convened a Council in 1473, held in the church of San Juan. Loyal to the cause of Princess Isabella for the succession to the crown, at the end of the 15th century, beginning of the 16th century, the façade of the church of Santa María, on which the royal coats of arms can be seen, among other works, was built.

The church, built in the 15th century in the Gothic style, is home to a 17th century altarpiece and a beautiful Renaissance pulpit, carved by Miguel Espinosa and Juan de Cambrey, among other works of art.

Also Gothic, although earlier than Santa María, is the church of San Juan. The façade is adorned with a portal of pointed arches supported by delicate spires, and a later image of Saint John the Baptist. In the chapel of the Calderonas you can see a Plateresque altarpiece, with paintings by an unknown artist from the early 16th century.

EASTER WEEK IN THE CITY OF BURGOS

Easter Week in the city of Burgos was declared of national tourist interest in 2013. From Good Friday to Easter Sunday, the brotherhoods take their procession through the most central streets, as well as many of the neighbourhoods of the city of El Cid. The Stations of the Cross and Rosaries on Easter Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday are the prelude to the intense main events in which the Passion is played out with typical processions and the celebration of the Holy Office in the Cathedral. The main days of Easter week includes such powerful moments as the procession of the Stations of the Cross with torches on Holy Monday, where a cross with a shroud is carried as a processional element. On Maundy Thursday, next to the Cathedral, the encounter between the processions of Jesus with the Cross on his shoulders and Our Lady of Sorrows is a must-see. Good Friday morning sees the Unbinding of the Cross, with the raising of the cross with the Holy Christ of Burgos, the proclamation of the Seven Words of Christ on the Cross, and the unbinding of the image. The sound of the North Tower or Tower of the Carraca (ratchet) of the Cathedral and the presentation of Christ to his Mother are particularly impressive. On Easter Sunday, once again next to the cathedral, Easter jubilation is announced with Handel's Alleluia and the dance of the Saint. Next, His Excellency the Archbishop of Burgos gives the blessing to the City. After the act, various Castilian dances are performed in honour of Christ and his Mother.

FABERO AND THE EL POZO JULIA MINE

The Fabero mining basin, in the region of El Bierzo, has been declared an Ethnological Site of Cultural Interest. It is made up of a large number of enclaves scattered throughout the municipality, which is of great heritage interest. One of the main mines is the Pozo Julia, whose construction dates back to 1947. After the disappearance of production activity and its closure in 1991, the former miners wanted to keep the memory of everything that mining had brought to the area alive. In 2007, the facilities were transferred to the Fabero City Council, who turned it into a space to illustrate the reality of mining in this basin. It is a large vertical shaft 275 metres deep accessed by a derrick with a lift and wagons, which is the most characteristic image of this mine. Visitors can now enjoy an hour-long tour where they learn about the working conditions of the miners, as well as their daily activities, visiting areas such as the lamp shop, the doctors' area, or the compressor room with machinery from the 1960s, as well as a faithful recreation of the mine.



DOVECOTS ROUTE IN PALENCIA

Dovecots are traditional constructions mainly from the Tierra de Campos region. Their function is the breeding of pigeons for consumption. The fact is that pigeons have been a typical dish since Roman times and are still a main dish in Palencia's gastronomy today. They are built of materials linked to the territory they occupy, which is why they are made of raw earth, adobe covered with lime, and have an internal wooden structure. They come in different shapes: circular, square, rectangular, polygonal, with or without an interior courtyard, and there are even some in the shape of a castle. In Palencia there is a Dovecot Interpretation Centre in Santoyo and another in Villalcázar de Sirga, where all the information about this typical construction is explained in detail, and you can also see what they are like inside.

ALBA DE TORMES CASTLE

You are invited to discover the keep of the Castle of the Dukes of Alba. Inside you can visit several rooms, such as the one with the frescoes of the battle of Mühlberg and go up to the belvedere from where you can see the village. Outside are the ruins of the archaeological excavations that have been gradually uncovering the former splendour of the castle, of which only this tower remains today. In 1429, Juan II of Castile granted Alba de Tormes to Gutiérrez Álvarez de Toledo, of the House of Alba, who ordered the construction of a Tower-Fortress as soon as he took possession. His successors carried out extension works, but it was Fernando Álvarez de Toledo, the Grand Duke, under whom the castle was adorned with the finest marble, paintings, and tapestries, making it one of the most sumptuous in Spain. Its walls housed illustrious guests such as Lope de Vega, Calderón de la Barca and Garcilaso de la Vega.



ZANCAO LIME KILNS

At the foot of the Sierra de Guadarrama is the town of Vegas de Matute. On the outskirts of this town, we find the Zancao Lime Kilns, winner of the Fuentes Claras environmental award for the sustainability of small municipalities. It is possible that there was an earlier lime kiln, but it was in the 16th century when its production intensified for the construction of the monastery of El Escorial. The manufacture of lime is a simple process, but the peculiarity of these kilns compared to others is the use of portals or pits. These were used as a shelter for the lime burner, who had to administer the necessary fuel and keep an eye on the temperature of the kiln on firing days. The whitest and purest stones were chosen from the nearest quarries and mountains, and bushes and broom were used as fuel, even from the pine forests of the Alto del León. Very close to the oldest kilns, an aqueduct has been preserved that carried water from the northern slope of Los Calocos to the village. To complete our visit to this town, the Gothic church of Santo Tomas of Canterbury, the work of Juan Gil de Hontañón, and two old palaces from the 16th century are must-sees.

THE BECQUER BROTHERS IN SORIA - CITY AND PROVINCE

Both Gustavo Adolfo and his brother Valeriano (painter) travelled to Soria in search of the traditions and roots of this land. They spent stays in the city, visiting their uncle Curro's house, as well as in the province. Gustavo Adolfo Bécquer was married to Casta Esteban from Torrubia de Soria and settled in Noviercas, where two of his three children were born. In the city of Soria, the main scenes of his works are the banks of the river Duero, the city walls, the monasteries of San Juan de Duero and San Polo, and the chapel of San Saturio. Other legends are set in places in the province of Soria, such as those of the Ojos Verdes, La Corza Blanca or La Promesa, in the towns of Almenar, Beratón and Gómara, respectively. Nowadays, every 1st November the Festival de las Ánimas is held in Soria, a spectacle linked to the legend of Monte de las Ánimas, recreated with a night walk and the reading of the legend at the foot of Monte de las Ánimas on the banks of the Duero River.



SANTA ESPINA MONASTERY

This Cistercian monastery is located 43.5 km from the capital of Valladolid, in the town of La Santa Espina, municipality of Castromonte. It was ordered to be built in 1147 (12th century) by Doña Sancha of Castile, with the intention of housing the donation made to her by the French king, Louis the Younger, which consisted of a thorn from the crown that Jesus Christ wore on the day of his passion and death, from which the monastery takes its name. This thorn is found in one of the chapels, that of the relic, which was designed by Francisco de Praves (a disciple of Herrera) in the 17th century. The building has undergone variations since its inception, a fire, the French invasion and even the confiscation of Mendizábal. Today it is walled in its entirety with a 15th century rampart, which has an arch through which you can access the interior, flanked by two towers. It has two cloisters, the hospice (Herrerian) and the regular cloister (Romanesque). The church has a polychrome wooden altarpiece from the 16th century. It currently has an Agricultural Training Centre in which different courses are given.

PEÑA VALDORADAS IN CARBAJALES DE ALBA

28 kilometres from Zamora is Carbajales de Alba, located on the shore of the Esla reservoir and immersed in the Tierra de Alba. The typical embroidery is well known here, including the colourful carbalina costumes, which have been made since the 16th century and won international awards. In the surrounding area we find such marvellous spots as Peña Valdoradas, which invites us to take a beautiful hiking route among rockroses, with a wonderful view of the reservoir. Associated with the rockrose is the "boletus edulis", a highly prized mushroom that is found almost exclusively in the rockrose fields of Almería and Tabares. It is interesting that all over Europe the "boletus" of the rockroses is already called "zamoránitos". They are smaller boletus, more aromatic, very tasty, and withstand the cold better.
