





Castilla y León is one of Europe's most blessed territories in natural beauty. The opportunities for nature-based tourism in Castilla y León are unrivalled. Our Autonomous Community boasts lush forests, large mountain ranges, incomparable valleys, unique caves, impressive river canyons, rivers, and lakes with a history that dates back millions of years.

The diversity of Natural Areas in Castilla y León make it a first-class destination. To ensure conservation in the Autonomous Community, the Autonomous Government of Castilla y León created the Network of Natural Areas in 1991, which currently comprises more than **30 Protected Natural** Areas of great ecological, geological, and scenic interest. It is also home to 10 UNESCO Biosphere Reserves and Las Loras Geopark, the only UNESCO Global Geopark in Castilla y León.

Furthermore, Castilla y León boasts **10 of the 48 UNESCO Biosphere Reserves** in Spain, which gives a good idea of how important sustainable development is to our Community.

It is also illustrative to highlight the importance of **Las Loras Unesco Global Geopark** which covers part of the north of the provinces of Burgos and Palencia. This is the only UNESCO Global Geopark in Castilla y León.

In this guidebook we plot out a journey through the natural areas of our 9 provinces in a **selection of 90 trails** chosen in partnership with the Department of Development and Environment and the Castilla y León Natural Heritage Foundation. We also include some recommendations of noteworthy trails with a wealth of heritage and/or fauna and flora, which make for a gateway into the beautiful landscapes and ecosystems to be discovered in our Autonomous Community.

Broadly, the trails are signposted and mostly suitable for people of all abilities and have a moderate or low level of difficulty. They are located close to places of interest and feature good facilities. We have used a simple naming system which includes the initials of the province and a number to indicate each of the 10 suggested trails per province, so that you can find them easily on the map we have included and on the tourist information website.

Additionally, we set out **7 long-distance trails** for you, which in their own way take you on an experience full of history and wonderful views in a blend of tourism, the great outdoors, culture, and sport.

Aranda de Duero has been awarded the title of European Wine City 2020 by RECEVIN, competing with incredible places like Haro, Rueda or La Palma del Condado. Due to the exceptional situation that happened in 2020, it has been extended during the years 2021 and 2022.

In the centre of the extensive fertile plain irrigated by the river Duero, lies the capital of the no less extensive riparian region: Aranda de Duero.

Repopulated in the 9th century, the name of this Castilian city appears for the first time in the Council of Husillos held in 1088. However, it already had very ancient settlements from whose languages it takes its name, Aranda, which means "wide plain", while Duero comes from the river's name. In the 13th century, Sancho IV and Pedro I had already granted the town the privilege of royal status, a status that the people of Aranda never wished to relinquish. Proof of this was demonstrated when, during the reign of Fernando IV, Diego López de Haro wanted to take over the town. The tower of the church of Santa María, built in the 12th century as a defensive feature of the town, bears witness to such courtly intrigues.



Court in the reign of Henry IV, where Archbishop Alfonso Carrillo convened a Council in 1473, held in the church of San Juan. Loyal to the cause of Princess Isabella for the succession to the crown, at the end of the 15th century, beginning of the 16th century, the façade of the church of Santa Maria, on which the royal coats of arms can be seen, among other works, was built.

The church, built in the 15th century in the Gothic style, is home to a 17th century altarpiece and a beautiful Renaissance pulpit, carved by Miguel Espinosa and Juan de Cambray, among other works of art.

Also Gothic, although earlier than Santa María, is the church of San Juan. The façade is adorned with a portal of pointed arches supported by delicate spires, and a later image of Saint John the Baptist. In the chapel of the Calderonas you can see a Plateresque altarpiece, with paintings by an unknown artist from the early 16th century.

TOURISM IDEAS IN CASTILLA Y LEÓN

THE FESTIVE DAY OF THE TRANSHUMANCE OF THE AVILEÑA - NEGRA IBERICA RACEBREED

This is an outdoor activity that takes place in Puerto del Pico and consists in observing watching the transhumant cows coming from the pastures of Extremadura on the final stretch before arriving home. The Avilanian Avileña cows walk along the Roman road of Puerto del Pico until they reach the rest area of the same portroute, where a meeting is held in order to spot the arrival of the transhumant herds. This is a truly spectacular sight to behold, accompanied by the imposing Roman road along which the cattle make their way back on foot, step by step. Visitors can enjoy a tasting of local products in the open fresh air. Transhumance is practicsed partly on foot, with displacements journeys averaging of an average of 250 km between the lands of Extremadura, Castilla-La Mancha and Ávila and, for the most part of it, mostly by truck. Some farmers are accompanied by their horses. At the same time the Transhumance Photo Contest takes place - a contest closely related to this





It This festival will be held in the town of Castrillo de Murcia (Burgos) on the 19th of June. It is a "Fiesta de Interés Turístico" (which means festival that has been declared touristic interest) religious Festival of Tourist Interest in Castilla y León and has a religious nature that resembles a sacramental act. It has been celebrated uninterruptedlyheld continuously since the beginning of the 17th century. The main character star of this festival is "El Colacho", a grotesque character who represents the devil, dressed in a brightly coloured outfit and a mask, and whips the townspeople who rebuke him with a horse's tail. Helt jumps over children under one year of age, to purify them and ward off evil from them. This figure has its precedent in the Roman pantomimes and plays of the Middle Ages.

HOSPITAL DE ÓRBIGO HOSPITAL CELEBRATES ITS MEDIEVAL JOUST

Hospital de Órbigo celebrates the Medieval Fairs Jousts of Passo Honroso on the first weekend of June. This festival has been declared touristic interestis a Festival of Tourist Interest in Castilla y León and brings together more thangathers crowds of over thirty thousand people each year. The tournament is one of the central acts events of the jousts, a step prior to the battle, along with the parade of banners and knights, as well as the medieval dances, in whichperformed by the ladies are the protagonists, and popular folk music. Tradition tells us that in 1434 Don Suero de Quiñones asked the king for permission to hold a tournament. Since he was deeply in love with Doña Leonor, he made a promise for which he had to fast every Thursday and wear an iron ring around his neck. The tournament lasted about thirty days, during which he showed the intentionalso set out to break, together with nine knights, more than 300 lances belonging to the noblemens and hidalgos from all over Europe who passed therethrough. Two monoliths commemorate this its history on the Puente Honroso bridge of this town that crosses the Órbigo River, one of the longest on the Camino de Santiago. The streets of the town are filled on those days with ladies, gentlemen, merchants, kings, jesters and monks dressed in their best suitsattire. The party ends on Sunday with the celebration of the Great Tournament and the recreation of Don Suero's victory.

PEDRAZA

Pedraza is one of those places where time seems to have stood stillhas stopped. It is a medieval town, which has beenwas declared a Monumental" (monumental ensemble)Monumental Ensemble in 1951. Located on a high stonerocky outcrop, the orography favours its defence, along with its complete wall and a single access doorgate. Once you cross this doorpass through this gate, you travel back in time to the past with its cobbled streets, stately homes with their hallwaysentrance halls, coats of arms... Its Plaza Mayor, a typical Castilian square, its old prison, located in a medieval building from the 13th century, with its dungeon, wooden cells, shackles... At one end of the town you can find the castle, a 13th-century fortress that was later rebuilt later. It currently houses the museum of dedicated to the painter Ignacio Zuloaga. But, iln addition to its culture and heritage, Pedraza offers you its gastronomy, commerce and its most representative festival, "los conciertos de las velas" (the concerts of the candles), which is celebrated on the first and second Saturdays of July. The Villa de Pedraza Foundation organizes this show withfeaturing renowned artists and they light up the town with thousands of candles, generating creating a special atmosphere throughout the town.

FESTIVITIES OF SAN JUAN DE SORIA CAPITAL

Soria changes its featurestransforms during these festivities, which last 5 days. The bull, the wine, the music, the quadrilles and much more take centre stage and turn a normally a quiet city into a bustling one. These festivities have been declared of tourist interest in Castilla y León since 1967. The festivities are opened with a speech from the balcony of the Town Hall. On the next day, which is called "Jueves La Saca Thursday" (Thursday), horses, runners and tame cattle bring the 12 bulls from Valonsadero to the bullring of in the capital. The encierro (the running of the bulls) is 8 km long., a bull run of 8 km. On Fryday, called "viernes de toros""Bull Friday", the bulls are fought in the bullring. The next day, "sábado Agés Saturday" (Saturday) the meat and offal of the steers are sold in anat auction. On Sunday, which is also called "domingo de calderasCauldron Sunday", the most important event takes place, which is is the big day, with the parade of the 12 groups carrying a kind of decorated model. The last day, the "lunes de bailas" (Monday of dances) "Dancing Monday", begins with a procession of the titular saints from each one of the neighbourhoods. In the afternoon, thousands of people from Soria go down to a meadow next to the river Duero to have a snackfor a picnic and, at night, the concert by the Municipal Music Band puts an end tobrings these festivities to a close.





WINE TOURISM IN VALLADOLID

The province of Valladolid has five designations of origin (Ribera del Duero, Rueda, Cigales, Toro and León), two designation of origin Vino de Pagoappellations for single vineyard wines (Urueña and Vizar), as well as a protected geographical indication (Wines from the land of Castile and Lion Vinos de la tierra de Castilla y León). Every year the "Valladolid Plaza Mayor del Vino" event is held in the capital. It usually takes place in May and the wines of the 5 designations of origin represented by different wineries in the province are tasted together with food from Castilla y León. During In 2022, the Brussels world competition and the FINE international wine tourism fair have also beenwere also held in the city of Pisuerga. Crossing the Arribes del Duero river canyon from the Miranda do Douro pier by boat is a trip that you cannot miss! You will feel like the Vikings sailing the Castilian fjords. It is a beautiful, quiet one-hour boat trip and you will see where you can spot birds and navigate between the spectacular vertical cliffs, which are up to 200 meters high. It is a wonderful landscape! During this trip, the experts of from the Biological Station explain to the visitors about the ethnographic resources, fauna, flora and geology of the park's tremendous cliffs of the park - both young and old will can learn many thingsa lot. After returning to the Biological Station, the activity continues with a tasting of hearty Porto wines, a visit to the Douro Valley Shop and to the facilities with otters and other species from the International Biological Station's Animal Therapy Program. Then, like good explorers, we recommend looking for viewpoints to see admire the canyon from above. You can find some beautiful ones viewpoints in Fariza, Fermoselle, Villadepera, Villardiegua de la Ribera, Mámoles, Pinilla de Fermoselle, Abelón, and Villaseco del Pan. And do not miss the tremendous dams of Miranda, Bemposta, Picote and Villalcampo, and the impressive Almendra dam, where scenes from "Terminator 6" were filmed in 2018.
